A NOTE FROM THE CEO

The fundamentals were certain when we entered our state legislative session on January 8th. We knew that the General Assembly would convene for the 120 days prescribed by our state constitution. As that same document mandates a balanced budget, we knew that legislators would have to cut \$1.2 billion in spending to meet that requirement. The question was, by the time we reached May 7th, what could we do to support the health of Coloradans, especially in such a difficult fiscal environment? As it turned out, a lot.

Colorado has experienced the nation's largest net decline in Medicaid enrollment since the pandemic, with more than half of that decline resulting from state bureaucratic failings. People who qualify for Medicaid are being excluded from coverage, leaving them without access to health care and putting health providers into a financial bind with an increase in uninsured patients. So, our first order of business was to do no further harm to Medicaid by convincing legislators to spare the program from the sizable budget cuts that had to be made.

We accomplished that mission, but we weren't done. We partnered with health care providers, health advocates, and leaders in both political parties to pass Senate Bill 290 on the very last day of session. This legislation will invest \$90 million state dollars over five years, which can grow to more than \$200 million with private investment and federal matching, to support health care for uninsured and low-income patients.

Even if you have health insurance, getting your insurance company to pay for mental health services can be frustratingly difficult. With the passage of House Bill 1002, it will now get easier. Before we passed this bill, there was no standard definition of "medical necessity" in law for mental health that insurance companies had to follow, even though it existed for physical health. With this new clarity, Colorado consumers will be better positioned to get the health care they're already paying for via their insurance premiums.

These positive outcomes, along with others to support early childhood development and more, were far from certain when the General Assembly gaveled in on a frigid Wednesday in January. They were the product of a perpetual, year-round process that we execute at Healthier Colorado, of which this very scorecard is a critical part. We recognize and hold legislators accountable for the votes they cast within our mission scope. When election time comes, we accordingly distribute resources to elect candidates in either party who support our agenda. Throughout the entire process, we engage with people like you to identify problems, develop solutions, and build the power we need to improve the health of Coloradans.

BECOMING A HEALTH CHAMPION

The mission of Healthier Colorado is to ensure all people have the opportunity to live a healthy life. We cannot reach this goal without passing pro-health policies at the Capitol and elected officials who prioritize the health of Coloradans. Throughout this scorecard, we grade each of Colorado's state legislators based on their votes on our pro-health policy priorities. We also recognize Health Champions: lawmakers whose leadership and hard work had an outsize impact on policies that improve the health of our families and communities.

WHO ARE OUR STATE LEGISLATORS?

An elected official is a person that you choose, through your vote, to represent you in local, state, and federal government. One hundred state legislators - 65 Representatives and 35 Senators - represent you at the state capitol throughout the 120-day annual legislative session. Every day, these individuals have an immense amount of influence over the laws that impact your ability to lead a healthy life.

TIER RANKING

As mighty as we may be, we can't devote 100% of our resources to every pro-health bill that is introduced. Instead, we tier bills to determine the level of support we are able to provide. We use the following standards to categorize the bills:

Healthier Colorado was present for the creation of the policy, expended all available resources to pass the bill, and was deeply involved in the legislative strategy.

TIER 2

Healthier Colorado supported the policy, stakeholder group, and legislative campaign but was not intimately involved in the strategy and/or creation of the policy. Limited resources may have been expended to support the campaign.

Healthier Colorado endorsed the policy and legislative campaign and spent a brief amount of time supporting the advancement of the policy.

STAR RANKING

We rank every legislator based on their sponsorship, co-sponsorship, and votes on pro-health bills. The more a legislator sponsored and voted on the bills we scored, the more stars they receive. The highest star ranking an elected official can earn is five stars. Elected officials who sponsor our Tier 1 bills are scored higher because they've invested significant time and effort to pass the bill – more than just committing to a vote.

LEGISLATIVE LEADERSHIP CIRCLE

Our Legislative Leadership Circle features legislators whose positions aligned with Healthier Colorado on each of the **39 bills we scored.** To be a member of our leadership circle, a legislator must vote on the side of health for every bill Healthier Colorado scored.



CARE ACCESS



Every Coloradan deserves access to affordable, quality health care. High costs of care, inadequate or no insurance options, and a lack of community services bar entry to our health system for many.

This year, legislators worked tirelessly to address those barriers and increase access to care by ensuring consumers actually receive the mental health and substance use benefits included in their health plans and decreasing costs of prescription medication through the regulation of Pharmacy Benefit Managers. They also created a fund to keep health care safety net providers from having to shut down, saving hundreds of thousands of Coloradans from being left without health care.

KEY BILLS

MEDICAL NECESSITY DETERMINATION INSURANCE COVERAGE HB25-1002

SPONSORS: Rep. Brown, Rep. Gilchrist, Sen. Amabile, Sen. B. Pelton

PRO-HEALTH POSITION: Support

FINAL ACTION: Signed into law

SUMMARY: Every Coloradan should have access to the mental health care they need when they need it, and nobody should be forced into debt in order to receive necessary care. By codifying a statutory definition of "medical necessity" for mental and behavioral health that aligns with current generally accepted standards of care from nonprofit clinical specialty associations, this bill ensures that state-regulated commercial health plans are not denying coverage for doctor-prescribed, medically necessary mental health and substance use treatment that should be covered under the patient's health plan.

75%+ of Coloradans with commercial insurance who have a diagnosed mental health condition have not received treatment.

STABILIZATION PAYMENTS FOR SAFETY NET PROVIDERS SB25-290

SPONSORS: Sen. Mullica, Sen. Kirkmeyer, Rep. Bird, Rep. Brown

PRO-HEALTH POSITION: Support

FINAL ACTION: Signed into law

SUMMARY: Safety net providers offer health care services to low-income, under- and uninsured Coloradans. With a rise in uninsured populations, Colorado's health care safety net is struggling due to the increased amount of uncompensated care. This bill provides financial relief to a broad cross-section of safety net providers serving low-income, uninsured individuals on a sliding-fee schedule or at no cost. The Provider Stabilization Fund will help safety net providers stay open, reduce staff layoffs, and maintain access to critical health care services.

In 2023 and 2024, nearly **600,000**

Coloradans lost access to health care through Medicaid.

PHARMACY BENEFIT MANAGER PRACTICES HB25-1094

SPONSORS: Rep. Brown, Rep. Johnson, Sen. B. Pelton, Sen. Roberts

PRO-HEALTH POSITION: Support

FINAL ACTION: Signed into law

SUMMARY: The high costs of prescription medication are increasingly out of reach for many Coloradans. Under current business practices, Pharmacy Benefit Managers, or PBMs, generate income from complex drug pricing in which they profit by charging Coloradans higher prescription drug prices. This bill will end PBMs' most harmful practices by requiring a flat, transparent service fee, restoring fairness and transparency to how prescription drugs are priced and reimbursed in our state.

While we strive to ensure every Coloradan has the chance to live a healthy life, there are drastic disparities across the state. Factors like zip code, family income, and race create barriers to receiving the opportunities we all deserve.

This session was transformational as state lawmakers passed bills to reduce barriers to health care for those who are incarcerated, create a voluntary do-notsell list for those who wish to waive their right to purchase a firearm, and establish a deflection and community investment program to support kids at risk of juvenile detention.

REPEAL COPAYMENT FOR DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS INMATE HEALTH CARE HB25-1026

SPONSORS: Rep. Carter, Rep. Garcia, Sen. Jodeh, Sen. Hinrichsen

PRO-HEALTH POSITION: Support

FINAL ACTION: Signed into law

SUMMARY: People who are incarcerated have a constitutional right to health care, and prison health care supports successful community reentry and well-being. This bill eliminates medical copayments charged to incarcerated individuals requesting health care services, including physical, mental, dental, and vision care. Access to health care services will reduce the spread of illness and reduce the need for emergency services, which cost us far more than preventative services in the long run and lead to worse health outcomes.

Reductions in prison health care use can increase the spread of illness and disease, negatively affecting people who are incarcerated, prison staff and visitors, and the broader public.

JUSTICE-INVOLVED YOUTH SB25-043

SPONSORS: Sen. Michaelson Jenet, Sen. Amabile, Rep. Bradfield, Rep. English

PRO-HEALTH POSITION: Support

FINAL ACTION: Amended into HB25-1146 and signed into law

SUMMARY: Research proves that the most effective way to increase public safety and prevent future crime is to utilize evidence-based interventions for youth at risk for juvenile justice involvement. This bill follows the evidence and serves kids in a way that reduces the likelihood of recidivism by establishing a deflection and community investment grant program to serve justice-involved youth, keeping them out of detention and serving them in the community. This bill was included in the final version of HB25-1146, Juvenile Detention Bed Cap, through negotiations amongst the sponsors of each bill.

INSURANCE COVERAGE OF PREVENTATIVE HEALTH-CARE SERVICES SB25-196

SPONSORS: Sen. Jodeh, Sen. Mullica, Rep. Lieder, Rep. Jackson

PRO-HEALTH POSITION: Support

FINAL ACTION: Signed into law

SUMMARY: Preventative health care services are essential in the early detection of conditions, preventing disease, and improving overall health outcomes – especially for our most vulnerable community members. This bill ensures continued coverage of Coloradans for evidence-based preventative health care services, including vaccinations, cancer screenings, and primary care, regardless of potential changes to federal guidelines or governing bodies.





Healthy communities are places where people have the opportunity to thrive – physically, mentally, and socially. By investing in community health, lawmakers have the power to strengthen the social fabric of our towns and cities and create the conditions that give everyone the chance to lead a healthy life.

This year, legislators built on the momentum of our 2024 policy to protect social media users against illegal activities, continued funding for Community Health Workers through Medicaid, and attempted to improve access and affordability of health insurance for Coloradans.


PROTECTIONS FOR USERS OF SOCIAL MEDIA SB25-086

SPONSORS: Sen. Frizell, Sen. Daugherty, Rep. Boesenecker, Rep. Hartsook

PRO-HEALTH POSITION: Support

FINAL ACTION: Vetoed by Governor Polis

SUMMARY: Social media is increasingly understood to be a significant public health crisis that requires immediate attention and action, particularly on behalf of our state's youth. This bill aimed to provide more transparency and accountability for social media companies through data reporting, removing users engaged in illegal activities such as selling drugs and firearms online, and mandating compliance with search warrants.

REIMBURSEMENT FOR COMMUNITY HEALTH WORKERS SB25-229

SPONSORS: Sen. Kirkmeyer, Sen. Bridges, Rep. Bird, Rep. Taggart

PRO-HEALTH POSITION: Support (Senate version); Oppose (House version)

FINAL ACTION: Signed into law after Conference Committee

SUMMARY: Community Health Workers (CHWs) link community members to essential health and social programs to promote access to community-based services and help patients navigate the complicated health care system. The important work of CHWs has been shown to reduce health disparities, improve health outcomes, and lower health care costs. Given Colorado's budget deficit, legislators originally considered not implementing SB23-002, which authorized Medicaid payments for CHWs. Instead, this bill will delay implementation until January 2026, and future funding will depend on available appropriations.

HEALTH INSURANCE AFFORDABILITY ENTERPRISE UPDATE HB25-1297

SPONSORS: Rep. Brown, Rep. Gilchrist, Sen. Jodeh

PRO-HEALTH POSITION: Support

FINAL ACTION: Postponed indefinitely by sponsors

SUMMARY: The Health Insurance Affordability Enterprise (HIAE), which is funded through a fee collected from commercial health plans, helps keep health care coverage accessible and affordable for Coloradans. This bill sought to increase the fee to maintain our state's reinsurance program, pay for enhanced subsidies for health insurance purchased on the state exchange, and fund the state's OmniSalud program. Without support for more affordable coverage, more Coloradans will be left without health insurance, leading to poor economic and health outcomes for families. Additionally, the rise in uncompensated care will continue to strain our safety net and rural hospitals.



Kids deserve every opportunity to grow into successful, healthy adults. Decisions that legislators make today can have both positive and detrimental effects on the well-being of children that last a lifetime. Access to health care, quality early childhood education, nutritious foods, and stable, safe housing can determine whether young people can be healthy as adults.

This year, legislators worked to strengthen the evidence-based HealthySteps program for children ages 0-3 and their families, rejected changes that could have disrupted the continued implementation of the Colorado Universal Preschool Program, and expanded the Family and Medical Leave Insurance Program for families with new babies who need extra time in the hospital.

Not only does Healthier Colorado recognize individual champions in this portion of the scorecard, but we also evaluate and reward both the Democratic and Republican caucuses as a whole for their policy efforts that ensure all of Colorado's kids, including those who face historical disadvantages, can lead healthy lives. Issues that support kids must never lean towards Democratic or Republican fault lines. Bipartisanship and meaningful policy advancements that invest in our children result in support during election cycles.

KEY BILLS

MEASURES TO SUPPORT EARLY CHILDHOOD HEALTH SB25-017

SPONSORS: Sen. Cutter, Sen. Jodeh, Rep. Joseph, Rep. Zokaie

PRO-HEALTH POSITION: Support

FINAL ACTION: Awaiting Governor's signature as of 06/02/25

SUMMARY: Before birth through age 5 is a critical time for a child's cognitive, social, emotional, and physical development. However, many of Colorado's youngest children are not receiving appropriate developmental screenings or access to needed services in a timely manner. This bill strengthens the HealthySteps program, an evidence-based pediatric primary care program that provides support to parents of children ages 0-3 in the interest of the child's healthy development.

MEASURES TO MODIFY THE DEPARTMENT OF EARLY CHILDHOOD SB25-119

SPONSORS: Sen. Kirkmeyer, Sen. Marchman, Rep. Garcia Sander, Rep. Hamrick

PRO-HEALTH POSITION: Oppose

FINAL ACTION: Postponed indefinitely by sponsors

SUMMARY: Research shows that investing in high-quality early childhood education can lead to higher educational attainment, better health outcomes, reduced crime rates, and increased workforce participation in the long term. In August 2023, Colorado launched its Universal Preschool Program. This bill would have made changes to the program that would have disrupted its successful implementation during its second year.

CHANGE PAID FAMILY MEDICAL LEAVE INSURANCE PROGRAM SB25-144

SPONSORS: Sen. Bridges, Sen. Winter, Rep. Willford, Rep. Zokaie

PRO-HEALTH POSITION: Support

FINAL ACTION: Awaiting Governor's signature as of 06/02/25

SUMMARY: Colorado's Family and Medical Leave Insurance (FAMLI) Program launched in 2024 to provide paid leave to workers who need to care for themselves or a family member. Paid leave provides new parents with the ability to bond with and care for their baby, while also giving the birthing person time to heal from childbirth. This bill extends the duration of the paid family and medical leave for up to an additional 12 weeks for a parent who has a child receiving inpatient care in a neonatal intensive care unit (NICU). The bill also changes the rate of premiums financing the program to ensure the future solvency of the fund.

Paid leave reduces infant mortality rates by 10%, provides parents with the opportunity to bond with their newborns, and can decrease maternal mood disorders.



METHODOLOGY

- Total stars were awarded to legislators based on the total percentage score of their overall voting and sponsorship records using the following criteria:
 - 5 Stars: above 100% score
 - 4 Stars: 100% 76% score
 - 3 Stars: 75% 51% score
 - 2 Stars: 50% 26% score - 1 Star: 25% score or less
- Methodology for awarding points:
 - Only votes with a recorded third reading were scored for the entire General Assembly.
 - Points for sponsorships are included regardless of a third reading vote taking place.
 - Sponsorship of a Healthier Colorado Tier 1 Bill = +3 points
 - Sponsorship of a Healthier Colorado Tier 2 Bill = +1 point
 - Sponsorship of a Healthier Colorado Tier 3 Bill = +0.333 points
 - Votes aligned with a pro-health position = +0.333 points
- Sponsorship of a bill Healthier Colorado opposed = 0.333 points
- Votes against a pro-health position = 0 points
- Votes occurring when legislators were excused or absent were not included in their final score.

Soon, Colorado voters will decide on a U.S. Senate seat, all five statewide offices, and 83 seats in the state legislature. Like our friends at Healthier Colorado say, HAWC has no permanent friends, no permanent enemies – only permanent interests: our public health. And we will ensure that every candidate knows exactly where we stand.

PROTECTING WORKERS FROM EXTREME TEMPERATURES HB25-1286

SPONSORS: Rep. Velasco, Rep. Froelich, Sen. Weissman, Sen. Cutter

PRO-HEALTH POSITION: Support

Heat #1 is the #1 Cause

of weather related deaths in the United States. FINAL ACTION: Postponed indefinitely by sponsors

SUMMARY: Extreme heat and cold temperatures significantly impact the health and safety of workers, both indoors and outdoors. Prolonged exposure to high temperatures, in particular, can lead to heat-related illnesses such as heat exhaustion and heat stroke, which can be fatal if not promptly treated. These conditions reduce productivity, increase the risk of accidents, and can result in long-term health issues. The Extreme Temperatures Colorado coalition introduced what would have been nation-leading legislation to protect workers across the state. While efforts were not successful this year, we will continue to advocate for policy change to protect workers and promote resiliency in our changing climate.

FINAL ACTION: Signed into law

SUMMARY: Buildings are the third-largest source of pollution in Colorado, accounting for 20% of greenhouse gas emissions in the state. The Colorado Energy Office and coalition partners introduced this bill to build upon Building Performance Standards established in 2021. Once implemented, the bill will improve ease of administration and building compliance and set up an enterprise to support the building sector to meet climate goals, improve energy efficiency, and reduce emissions – which will, in turn, create a healthierenvironment for every Coloradan.

FINAL ACTION: Signed into law

SUMMARY: In 2023, Colorado had some of the longest solar permitting timelines in the western United States. This bill will make getting a permit for a home to install solar panels faster and easier, promoting faster adoption to protect our environment and improve public health. It will require cities, counties, and the state to make available an automated online software platform for approving residential solar and battery permits, saving time and resources for local permitting offices.


