# A NOTE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Friends,

If there was one word that defined Colorado's 2026 legislative session, it was *challenge*.

Lawmakers entered the session facing one of the most difficult fiscal environments since the early days of the pandemic. A growing budget shortfall, made even larger by the state's March revenue forecast, forced policymakers to make tough decisions about how to allocate limited resources while protecting the services Coloradans rely on every day. At the same time, uncertainty surrounding federal policy, including the impacts of H.R. 1, created new questions about Colorado's fiscal future, health care system, and economic stability.

Adding to the complexity, this is a major election year. With statewide races and important ballot measures on the horizon, every decision made under the Gold Dome unfolded in an environment of heightened political attention and competing pressures.

Yet despite these challenges, this session also offered something equally important: proof that progress is still possible.

Time and again, legislators, advocates, community leaders, and everyday Coloradans came together to find solutions to some of our state's most pressing challenges. Lawmakers advanced policies to improve health, strengthen communities, protect consumers, support children and families, and create opportunities for future generations to thrive.

The reality is that Colorado's challenges are significant. Families continue to face high costs for housing, health care, and everyday necessities. Communities are navigating workforce shortages, economic uncertainty, and growing demands on public services. And the decisions made in Washington, D.C., increasingly shape what is possible here at home.

But if this legislative session demonstrated anything, it is that Colorado's future is not defined by the obstacles in front of us. It is defined by our willingness to work together to overcome them.

This scorecard tells the story of that work. It highlights the votes, policies, and leadership that helped move Colorado forward during a year when progress was far from guaranteed. While not every challenge was solved and not every opportunity was realized, there were meaningful victories worth celebrating and important lessons that will guide the work ahead.

As you review this year's scorecard, we hope it serves as a reminder that even during difficult times, thoughtful leadership and sustained advocacy can make a real difference. The work continues, but there is every reason to be optimistic about what Colorado can achieve together.

# BECOMING A HEALTH CHAMPION

The mission of Healthier Colorado is to ensure all people have the opportunity to live a healthy life. We cannot reach this goal without passing pro-health policies at the Capitol or without elected officials who prioritize the health of Coloradans. Throughout this scorecard, we grade each of Colorado's state legislators based on their votes on our pro-health policy priorities. We also recognize Health Champions: lawmakers whose leadership and hard work had an outsize impact on policies that improve the health of our families and communities.

## WHO ARE OUR STATE LEGISLATORS?

An elected official is a person that you choose, through your vote, to represent you in local, state, and federal government. 100 state legislators - 65 Representatives and 35 Senators - represent you at the state capitol throughout the 120-day annual legislative session. Every day, these individuals have an immense amount of influence over the laws that impact your ability to lead a healthy life.

## TIER RANKING

As mighty as we may be, Healthier Colorado can't devote 100% of our resources to every pro-health bill that is introduced. Instead, we tier bills to determine the level of support we are able to provide. We use the following standards to categorize the bills:

### TIER 1

Healthier Colorado was present for the creation of the policy, expended all available resources to pass the bill, and was deeply involved in the legislative strategy.

### TIER 2

Healthier Colorado supported the policy, stakeholder group, and legislative campaign but was not intimately involved in the strategy and/or creation of the policy. Limited resources may have been expended to support the campaign.

### TIER 3

Healthier Colorado endorsed the policy and legislative campaign and spent a brief amount of time supporting the advancement of the policy.

## STAR RANKING

We rank every legislator based on their sponsorship, co-sponsorship, and votes on pro-health bills. The more a legislator sponsored and voted on the bills we scored, the more stars they receive. The highest star ranking an elected official can earn is five stars. Elected officials who sponsor our Tier 1 bills are scored higher because they've invested significant time and effort to pass the bill - more than just committing to a vote.

## LEGISLATIVE LEADERSHIP CIRCLE

Our Legislative Leadership Circle features legislators whose positions aligned with Healthier Colorado on each of the **36 bills we scored**. To be a member of our leadership circle, a legislator must vote on the side of health for every bill Healthier Colorado scored.



# CARE ACCESS



More than **4 in 5 physicians** are now employed by hospitals, insurance companies, or other corporate entities, reflecting a growing concentration of control across the health care system.

Every Coloradan deserves access to affordable, quality health care. High costs of care, inadequate or no insurance options, and a lack of community services bar entry to our health system for many.

This year, state lawmakers worked to mitigate the damaging effects of federal cuts, preserve Medicaid coverage, and kickstart a review of Medicaid as new information about mass disenrollments, overpayment errors, and questions about administrative oversight came to light. Legislators also protected access to vital mental health care by requiring insurers to maintain accurate provider directories and addressed workforce shortages by credentialing providers faster and ensuring the pipeline to join networks remains accessible for pre-licensed providers.

## KEY BILLS

### PROVIDER PARTICIPATION IN HEALTH INSURANCE **HB26-1002**

**SPONSORS:** Rep. Brown, Rep. Gilchrist, Sen. Ball, Sen. B. Pelton

**PRO-HEALTH POSITION:** Support

**FINAL ACTION:** Signed Into Law

**SUMMARY:** Too many Coloradans who need mental health or substance use care can't find a provider who takes their insurance, not because providers don't exist, but because the system makes it too hard for them to participate. HB26-1002 addresses that gap in three ways: it requires insurers to actively verify whether providers in their networks are actually accepting patients, allows prelicensed mental health providers to be reimbursed for services they deliver under supervision, and reduces the clinical hours required to become a licensed clinical social worker. Together, these changes mean more providers can work within the insurance system sooner, and patients are less likely to encounter outdated or inaccurate network directories.

More than half of Coloradans receive health insurance through an employer, making provider network participation critical to accessing covered care.

### CONSUMER PROTECTIONS MEDICAL CARE ENTITIES **SB26-041**

**SPONSORS:** Sen. Kipp, Sen. Weissman, Rep. Brown, Rep. McCormick

**PRO-HEALTH POSITION:** Support

**FINAL ACTION:** Postponed Indefinitely

**SUMMARY:** When hospitals, insurance companies, and other health care entities merge or are acquired, the effects can be significant: higher prices, fewer choices, and less accountability for patients. SB26-041 would have strengthened Colorado's ability to oversee those deals by expanding the Attorney General's authority to review health care mergers and acquisitions before they close, requiring earlier and broader notice of proposed transactions, and strengthening provider referral disclosure requirements so patients know when a financial relationship is behind a recommendation. The bill was postponed indefinitely in the Senate Health & Human Services Committee, meaning these consumer protections won't be in place as consolidation in Colorado's health care market continues.

### ESTABLISHING COMMISSION ON MEDICAID **SB26-187**

**SPONSORS:** Sen. Amabile, Sen. Bridges, Rep. Brown, Rep. Taggart

**PRO-HEALTH POSITION:** Support

**FINAL ACTION:** Signed Into Law

**SUMMARY:** Colorado's Medicaid program has faced serious turbulence in recent years. Between 2023 and 2025, roughly 500,000 Coloradans were removed from Medicaid rolls as pandemic-era eligibility protections expired and thousands were inaccurately dropped, delaying pediatric cancer care, critical surgeries, and other essential services. At the same time, administrative missteps led to tens of millions of dollars in overpayments, with advocates warning that children and families have suffered most from the mismanagement. Against this backdrop, SB26-187 creates a 10-member legislative Commission on Medicaid to develop recommendations on spending, utilization, and administration in light of new federal policies, backed by roughly \$500,000 in state funding to strengthen accountability and prevent future errors.

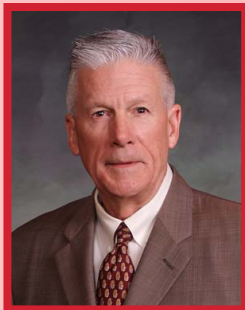

# BRIDGING THE GAP



Nearly **1 in 3** Colorado adults has a criminal record, creating barriers that can prevent qualified people from accessing education, training, and good-paying jobs.

While we strive to ensure every Coloradan has the chance to live a healthy life, there are drastic disparities across the state. Factors like zip code, family income, and race create barriers to receiving the opportunities we all deserve.

In 2026, our legislators took steps to protect funding for critical programs that prevent families from losing access to health insurance coverage and safety net clinics that communities rely on. The State Legislature also lowered barriers to employment, housing, and education opportunities for immigrant communities by expanding methods of identity verification for non-employment-based opportunities. Lawmakers also moved to protect Coloradans from predatory medical debt collection practices.

## KEY BILLS

### HEALTH INSURANCE AFFORDABILITY MEASURES SB26-178

**SPONSORS:** Sen. Mullica, Sen. Jodeh, Rep. Brown, Rep. Gilchrist

**PRO-HEALTH POSITION:** Support

**FINAL ACTION:** Signed Into Law

**SUMMARY:** Health insurance is only useful if people can afford it – and for tens of thousands of Coloradans, affordability has been at serious risk. With Congress failing to extend federal ACA tax credits, Colorado stepped in. SB26-178 funds the Health Insurance Affordability Enterprise with \$40 million from the Marijuana Tax Cash Fund and \$100 million in repayable bonds to keep premiums from skyrocketing for the 2027 plan year. Without it, Coloradans would have faced an average \$2,000 annual premium increase, and as many as 22,000 people could have lost coverage entirely. This is a one-year fix, so legislators will need to return next session to find a long-term solution.

More than **345,000** Coloradans lack health insurance, and rising costs are putting both families and hospitals under increasing financial strain.

### NON-EMPLOYMENT EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES BACKGROUND CHECK INFORMATION HB26-1143

**SPONSORS:** Rep. Ricks, Rep. Joseph, Sen. Weissman, Sen. Benavidez

**PRO-HEALTH POSITION:** Support

**FINAL ACTION:** Signed Into Law

**SUMMARY:** Colorado is facing real workforce shortages in health care and other essential fields. Yet many students who complete all their coursework still can't finish their clinical training because they lack a Social Security number. HB26-1143 fixes this by requiring hospitals, clinics, universities, and other entities to accept an Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN) in place of a Social Security number for background checks tied to unpaid educational opportunities like clinical placements and internships. Safety isn't compromised, and Colorado can now tap into a pipeline of qualified, multilingual, and culturally connected health care workers.

### LIMITATIONS ON COLLECTION ACTIONS FOR MEDICAL DEBT HB26-1267

**SPONSORS:** Rep. Joseph, Rep. Mabrey, Sen. Jodeh, Sen. Weissman

**PRO-HEALTH POSITION:** Support

**FINAL ACTION:** Postponed Indefinitely

**SUMMARY:** Medical debt is one of the most common financial crises Coloradans face, and the collection tactics used to recover it can be devastating. HB26-1267 would have banned wage garnishment for medical debt, prohibited seizure of bank accounts with \$5,000 or less, limited collection actions to within three years of the debt, and required creditors to verify patients had been screened for public insurance or financial assistance before pursuing collections. This bill was postponed indefinitely in the House Health and Human Services Committee.

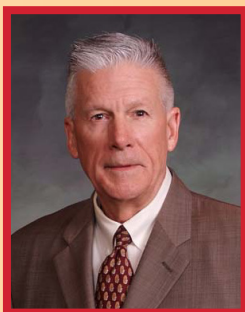

Colorado families carry about **\$1 billion in medical debt**, with communities of color facing some of the state's highest and most persistent burdens.



# HEALTHY COMMUNITIES



Coloradans bet more than **\$6 billion** on sports in 2024, and nationally, **1 in 2** online sports bettors show signs of addiction or at-risk behavior like chasing losses.

Healthy communities are places where people have the opportunity to thrive – physically, mentally, and socially. By investing in community health, lawmakers have the power to strengthen the social fabric of our towns and cities and create the conditions that give everyone the chance to lead a healthy life.

This session, legislators responded to emerging online risks by passing legislation establishing safety standards to protect the mental health of AI chatbot users and limit detrimental impacts of online sports betting. In response to shifts at the federal level, state lawmakers passed new laws maintaining consistent access to safe, evidence-based vaccines across healthcare settings in Colorado.

## KEY BILLS

### CONVERSATIONAL ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE SERVICE OPERATOR REQUIREMENTS HB26-1263

**SPONSORS:** Rep. Camacho, Rep. Mabrey, Sen. Jodeh, Sen. Carson

**PRO-HEALTH POSITION:** Support

**FINAL ACTION:** Signed Into Law

**SUMMARY:** AI chatbots have moved from novelty to daily reality for millions of Coloradans, and the rules governing them haven't kept pace. HB26-1263 establishes baseline safety standards for conversational AI services operating in Colorado, with stronger protections for minors, including restrictions on manipulative, engagement-maximizing design tactics that research has linked to real harm for young people.

**3 in 4 teens** use AI for emotional support or companionship, but leading AI platforms are failing to recognize and respond appropriately to mental health conditions in young people.

### SPORTS BETTING PROTECTIONS SB26-131

**SPONSORS:** Sen. Ball, Sen. B. Pelton, Rep. Woodrow, Rep. Woog

**PRO-HEALTH POSITION:** Support

**FINAL ACTION:** Signed Into Law

**SUMMARY:** Colorado legalized sports betting in 2019, and since then, it has become one of the most active sports betting markets in the country. The data on problem gambling, especially among young adults, has grown more concerning ever since. SB26-131 responds with commonsense, evidence-informed guardrails: restricting credit card use for sports betting accounts, capping deposits at five per 24-hour period, banning bonus payout promotions, restricting advertising during live sporting event

### PROMOTING IMMUNIZATION ACCESS SB26-032

**SPONSORS:** Sen. Daugherty, Sen. Mullica, Rep. Ferret, Rep. Brown

**PRO-HEALTH POSITION:** Support

**FINAL ACTION:** Signed Into Law

**SUMMARY:** As federal leadership has sown confusion and uncertainty around vaccine policy, Colorado has moved to protect its own residents. SB26-032 insulates Colorado's immunization program from federal dysfunction by authorizing the state Board of Health to use science-based vaccine guidelines from trusted medical organizations like the American Academy of Pediatrics and the American Academy of Family Physicians, rather than relying solely on federal guidance. The law also codifies pharmacists' authority to prescribe and administer vaccines, expands liability protections to more qualified health professionals who provide immunizations, and updates funding flexibility for state immunization programs.

# EARLY CHILDHOOD



For every dollar spent on early care and education, **\$2.25** is returned to the state's economy.

**Kids deserve every opportunity to grow into successful, healthy adults. Decisions that legislators make today can have both positive and detrimental effects on the well-being of children that last a lifetime.**

This year, legislators worked to preserve progress made in previous years while also making childcare more affordable and accessible. Lawmakers also attempted to increase funding for programs that help low-income families access childcare and early childhood education. Legislators also extended the Child Care Contribution Tax Credit (CCTC) to continue to allow this tool to continue supporting the child care and afterschool programs.

Not only does Healthier Colorado recognize individual champions in this portion of the scorecard, but we also evaluate and reward both the Democratic and Republican caucuses as a whole for their policy efforts that ensure all of Colorado's kids, including those who face historical disadvantages, can lead healthy lives. Issues that support kids must never lean towards Democratic or Republican fault lines. Bipartisanship and meaningful policy advancements that invest in our children result in support during election cycles.

## KEY BILLS

### INVESTMENT PERFORMANCE AUTHORITY **SB26-180**

**SPONSORS:** Sen. Bright, Sen. Marchman, Rep. Garcia, Rep. Taggart

**PRO-HEALTH POSITION:** Support

**FINAL ACTION:** Postponed Indefinitely

**SUMMARY:** Child care in Colorado is unaffordable for too many families and inaccessible for thousands more. Enrollment in the Colorado Child Care Assistance Program (CCCAP), which helps low-income families pay for care, is currently paused in more than 25 counties, leaving roughly 14,000 eligible children without a slot. SB26-180 was one of several funding approaches lawmakers explored this session to address this crisis. It would have created an Investment Performance Authority, a state-run fund that would attract voluntary investments from government entities and direct a portion of the returns toward child care assistance for low-income families.

### UPDATES TO CHILD CARE ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS **HB26-1260**

**SPONSORS:** Rep. Garcia, Rep. Willford, Sen. Cutter, Sen. Bright

**PRO-HEALTH POSITION:** Support

**FINAL ACTION:** Signed Into Law

**SUMMARY:** Healthier Colorado helped pass the original legislation that made the Colorado Child Care Assistance Program (CCCAP) more affordable and accessible, including capping family co-payments at 7% of income, paying providers in advance, and expanding access for underserved communities. Those changes were set to take effect in August 2026. But facing a significant state budget deficit this year, HB26-1260 delays those improvements until August 2028, saving the state roughly \$11 million. This was not a victory, but it was a deliberate choice: without this bill, those hard-won reforms risked being repealed entirely rather than preserved.

### CONTINUATION OF CHILD CARE CONTRIBUTION TAX CREDIT **HB26-1004**

**SPONSORS:** McCluskie, Rep. Caldwell, Sen. Coleman, Sen. Simpson

**PRO-HEALTH POSITION:** Support

**FINAL ACTION:** Signed Into Law

**SUMMARY:** Colorado's child care crisis has reached a breaking point for working families. Half of Coloradans live in a child care desert, infant care at a center averages \$21,000 a year, and nearly 14,000 children statewide are on waitlists after enrollment freezes swept through the state's assistance program. For a single parent, that cost can eat up 43% of their paycheck, and one in five parents has been fired due to child care disruptions. In response, HB26-1004 extends the Child Care Contribution Tax Credit for 10 years, preserving a 50% income tax credit for taxpayers who make qualifying donations to promote child care in the state, up to \$100,000. In tax year 2023 alone, around \$33 million in credits were claimed by nearly 16,000 taxpayers, generating \$66 million for the child care ecosystem through contributions to child care centers, financial assistance programs, and provider training.

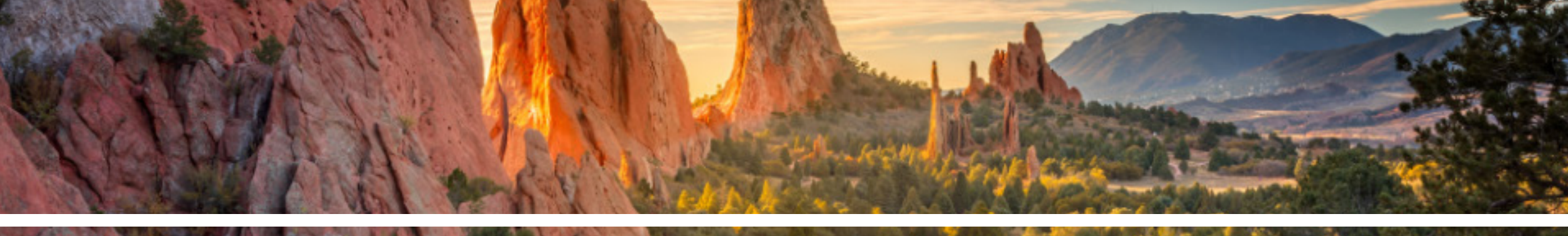

## METHODOLOGY

- Total stars were awarded to Legislators based on the total percentage score of their overall voting and sponsorship records using the following criteria:
  - 5 Stars: above 100% score
  - 4 Stars: 100% - 76% score
  - 3 Stars: 75% - 51% score
  - 2 Stars: 50% - 26% score
  - 1 Star: 25% score or less
- Methodology for awarding points:
  - Only votes with a recorded third reading were scored for the entire General Assembly.
  - Points for sponsorships are included regardless of a third reading vote taking place.
  - Sponsorship of a Healthier Colorado Tier 1 Bill = +3 points
  - Sponsorship of a Healthier Colorado Tier 2 Bill = +1 point
  - Sponsorship of a Healthier Colorado Tier 3 Bill = +0.333 points
  - Votes aligned with a pro-health position = +0.333 points
  - Sponsorship of a bill Healthier Colorado opposed = - 0.333 points
  - Votes against a pro-health position = 0 points
  - Votes occurring when legislators were excused or absent were not included in their final score.
